Site History

Industrial uses dating back to the early 1800s


Shipbuilding, sawmill operations, foundry, salt and grain storage, bulk petroleum storage, rail shipping, river terminal, brewery

Historical uncontrolled fill

Dredged river sand, concrete rubble, and debris, sawdust, foundry residuals, industrial debris, unknowns

Riverfront: frequent flooding

(Prior to floodwall construction in early 1970s)

Vital part of community through 1800s and into the 1900s


Steady decline beginning in 1950s
